ICANN says this is the first step in allowing more scripts in web addresses. Next in line for approval are Chinese, Tamil and Thai. The new system is part of a plan to make the Internet more global. Until this new change, anyone making a website had to use English in the address, even if they didn't understand the language.

One of the first websites with an Arabic address is the Egyptian Ministry of Communications. Its spokesman Tarek Kamal told the Associated Press that the new system was a "milestone in internet history". He added: "This great step will open up new horizons for e-services in [Arabic]. It will boost the number of online users...and enable Internet services to [break into] new [markets] by eliminating language barriers." Website makers will be able to create Arabic addresses that are read from right to left. Arabic only makes up one per cent of all the content on the Internet. However, Arabs make up five per cent of the world population and Arab web surfers have increased by 2,000 per cent in the past ten years.
