"This morning I learnt that he's...talking more than he should - because he talks a lot you know," Mr. Chavez said. Colombia's largest rebel group the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia also sent Castro a message. "We hope you'll recover in the shortest time possible," it said in a statement. Fidel Castro is one of the world's longest-ruling leaders. He has held power while nine US presidents have been and gone.
