He was surprised at how much his students preferred news-based lessons than those from textbooks. He has subsequently uploaded another seven sites and over 3,500 lessons – all free. Sean said his sites have become a "positive addiction" and that "more are in the pipeline". He is hoping students and teachers will like the revised, beefed up site, and that they will provide him with feedback on it.
